In a world with a population of 7 billion people, there are only about ten thousand who are actively studying how to grow African violets. There are many more who grow them, but most are very



casual growers who simply like the pretty colors or how easily they bloom in a home setting. You are different. You wouldn't be reading this now if you weren't pretty unusual.

Last week, the growing tip was about moistening your potting mix before using it. After that email went out, there was a lot of discussion. I was contacted by Reinhold Holtkamp Jr., the President of the Optimara Group of Herman Holtkamp Greenhouses Inc. Mr. Holtkamp wanted to discuss the addition of wetting agents to cause potting mix to absorb water more readily. Reinhold wrote: "Our company has done many tests and have found that wetting agent is bad for the violet. I would not recommend any wetting agent for any African violet." There are issues with surfactants, and it's good for you to have his insight. In research, I also found a blog by Jerry Coleby-Williams which raised many questions about the dangers to plants in general. I also found products including Miracle Gro Moisture Control Potting Mix which touts the advantages of using their product which contains a wetting agent. A Facebook grower recommended Physan 20, which is an algaecide, as an effective wetting agent with minimal side effects.


